

Dear Friends,

We seem to hear an awful lot in the media these days about "Fake News," a phrase that few of us had ever heard before the election of Donald Trump as President of the USA, whereas it now feels as if we hear the expression on an almost daily basis.

Apparently, because S.Cuthbert's didn't elect any Churchwardens this year, they will have to close and because it's a united benefice that means that Holy Cross must shut its door too.

That is a classic example of fake news! Yes there are grains of truth there – S.Cuthbert's didn't elect any Churchwardens at this year's Annual Parochial Church





Verges and pollinators.

Our verges and pollinators project has two strands – verge walks to survey the wildflowers on the sides of minor roads and raising awareness of the importance of verges as a relict habitat and resource for pollinators, with the aim of influencing verge management. So, we were delighted when, after a meeting with us last July, RoadLink, who manage the

A69, agreed to trial 'no herbicides'. Here is an extract from their email: 'We have discussed your comments and decided that we will not be carrying out weed spraying along the verges of the A69 next year. This will be on a rolling trial basis until such time that it becomes uneconomical or unsafe to remove weeds / ragwort by other methods. We will continue to target spray filter drains / injurious weeds and other areas deemed necessary for safety reasons.' Please let me know if think this promise is being broken. Sue 016977 47359





Haltwhistle Town Council June 2017

Chair's Report May 2017

During the last year the Town Council has been working very hard to progress various schemes.

I would like to thank all of you for your support and commitment in your role as a Town Councillor which you all do voluntarily on behalf of the people of Haltwhistle. Earlier this year we welcomed John Elliott to the council and now welcome Ivy Stott and Gail Ward following the elections last week.

The Town Council continue to provide financial assistance of £5,000 towards the monthly luncheon club and drop in centre which are very well received. The Town Council have given £6,000 for youth services and the money has been used to fund youth services in Haltwhistle for the benefit of our young people to help them build a future which we feel is very important. We are working with Northumberland County Council to get the land to the southwest of the Black Bull Public House transferred to the Town Council and we would be responsible for maintaining it in the future.

With regards to the Burn football field, drainage and levelling works have been carried out by Brambledowns and the additional drainage work has now been completed and the reseeding of the land has also been done. It is unlikely that the pitch will be used very much until next season.

We continue to receive monthly reports from the police regarding the number of incidents which is appreciated as it is important that we work together with them.

The Town Council continue to be responsible for the maintenance of the three play areas on Comb Hill, the Fire Station and at Hadrian's Rise.

The Grounds Maintenance Contract has now been let to Northumberland County Council. We have provided a new bus shelter on top of the Castle Hill during the year.

The Town Council continue to work with Northumberland County Council regarding the condition of the footpaths and the roads in and around Haltwhistle and some work has been carried out during the last year which is much appreciated but much work needs to be done and in certain areas the flags are in very poor condition. We also continue to press for improvements of the A69. It is hoped that the much needed improvements to the whole length of the Hemmel Burn will be carried out this year with the help of the County Council and the Environment Agency.

The flooding group continues to work closely with many different agencies to improve the drainage and infrastructure in our town.

We have carried out some work on the Burn footpath following the flooding in December 2015 but further works are still needed to be carried out and this work will be done during the summer months. The Town Council is only responsible for the maintenance of the footpath.

Once again, the Town Council have funded the putting up and taking down of the Christmas lights and can I thank the Chamber of Trade for all of their continued support.

I would also like to thank the Town Carnival and Walking Festival committees which are a great success and bring visitors into the town. We will continue to work with the South Tynedale Railway Preservation Society regarding their plans to reopen the railway from Alston to Haltwhistle which will bring economic benefits to our businesses.

We will also continue to work with Northumberland National Park Authority with the new Sill Development as we want our town and its traders to benefit.

The Town Council continues to support the Swimming and Leisure Centre financially and the Council have four members on the Management Committee and the Council receives regular reports on the progress of the Centre.

The Council also financially assist both the Haltwhistle Partnership and the Haltwhistle and District Burial

Committee and have representation on their committees.

The Town Council have replaced some litter bins and public seats and much maintenance work has been carried out on the public seats during this year.


